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

2-3 million deaths every year.

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


AAP has trained 454 child health providers, public health professionals, and youth to be the voice for children to impact national and sub-national child health policy via immunization and NCD advocacy workshops.

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Almost everywhere in the world, a child born today has a better chance at surviving to age 5 than in 1990, but inequities persist among and within countries.





Globally, infectious diseases, including pneumonia, diarrhea, and malaria, along with pre-term birth, birth asphyxia, and trauma, and congenital anomalies remain the leading causes of death for children under five.

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The number of children living in poverty has increased to approximately 1.2 billion due to the COVID-19 pandemic.






23 million children missed out on basic childhood vaccines through routine health services in 2020 as a result of the **COVID-19** pandemic



Helping Babies Survive is a suite of three evidencebased training programs designed to improve neonatal survival in resource-limited settings.







More than 850K providers across 80+ countries have been trained in the Helping Babies Survive suite of programs, and educational materials have been translated into 27+ languages.







Helping Babies Survive seeks

to make progress towards achieving the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals target of ending the preventable deaths of newborns by 2030.

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Essential Newborn Care (ENC) Now! is a new digital training package that supports remote facilitation of the new WHO ENC program using an online platform, allowing providers to learn and practice key course objectives in a safe and effective way.



The AAP Julius B. Richmond Center of Excellence engages pediatric societies in priority countries to mobilize champions to advocate for tobacco control policies and interventions to improve health and wellness of children and adolescents.





AAP elevates pediatric voices by directly advocating with the U.S. Congress, the Administration, and the UN to promote programs and policies that prioritize the health and well-being of all children

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The AAP, as part of the Thrive Coalition, led efforts to pass the Global Child Thrive Act into law in January 2021. They continue to advocate around the importance of global early childhood development and work with USAID on implementation of the law.

Global Health Education Virtual Course November 13, 2021

The Global Health Education Course (GHEC) will prepare pediatricians and trainees at all stages of their careers who have an interest in global health, and who need further education and resources to get involved. Based on the results of the AAP Periodic Survey, one-third of pediatric respondents are interested in global health, yet 50% of these do not feel well prepared. GHEC will fill the need for those who want to participate in global health work, and move toward a more standardized, ethical approach to this work.

Delivery of the course will include asynchronous pre-course work, a live virtual event, and a community of learning before and after the course that will enrich and augment the online modules to make your global health education more meaningful.

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
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
