SESSION OVERVIEW

What is nimble innovation and why is it key to adaptive government design practices? What tools can landscape architects use to tackle big problems at the local government level? This session will define the differences between probability and possibility government, discuss the pressing need for government workplaces that foster nimble innovation, and provide case studies of projects that are making possibility government work.
