While it is a fact that cities across the nation and world are becoming more green, it's also a fact that many communities within these cities are being left behind. Baltimore is a perfect example. In this presentation, we'll share essential lessons on communityled design from Nature Sacred and specifically the evolution of Bliss Meadows and the Sacred Place therein. Bliss Meadows is a 10 acre plot of land within an area of Baltimore that is home to a predominantly Black population. We'll talk lessons learned and also look at issues, questions and steps landscape architects should be asking and taking when working with diverse communities.
