CASE STUDY BEYOND THERAPY



In the fall of 2012, Beyond Therapy incorporated a Sparkle Interactive Light Bench into their routine to assist speech, occupational and physical therapists in providing therapeutic and educational services to children with special needs. **10 years later, Beyond Therapy continues to use this great piece of equipment daily in their sensory room.**

Key Findings:

- Patient response was highly favorable. The attraction of the technology piqued the patient's curiosity, captured their attention, and served as a major motivational tool
- The technology helped children 'visualize' the therapist's instruction and desired outcomes, while the real-time feedback increased their desire and ability to learn
- The equipment enhanced the in-session play experience, making it fun and enjoyable for the child and more productive for the therapist. Patients recalled their experiences with the equipment and were eager to return for their next session
- The Sparkle Interactive Light Bench helped stimulate voluntary movement and was found to be ideal for developing handwriting skills, finger isolation, increasing finger strength, and teaching patients to walk heel-to-toe

Sample Applications:

- A 7-year-old cancer patient rehabilitating from surgery to remove a tumor from her femur achieved 'staddle abduction' by standing on the Sparkle Bench and swiping the lights with her foot
- A 5-year-old with autism and decreased finger isolation/imitation ability was inspired to imitate vertical and horizontal lines with finger isolation on the Sparkle Bench
- A 4-year-old spina bifida patient with decreased mobility of his legs was motivated to perform his leg exercises while sitting on the Sparkle Bench and moving his legs to change the color of the lights
- Patients with hyper-tonicity were motivated to open their hands and stretch their tight muscles to see the lights change color






