Session Title Designing Sites of Meaning and Consequence: The Imperative for Collaboration Across Disciplines

Summary Overview

How does the design and construction process change when an architect is the prime or when a landscape architect is the prime? This interactive panel of designers will share approaches and outcomes that foster exploration and cooperation in creative collaboration. This session brings together two prominent architecture and urban design practices with two leading landscape architecture practices, each with creative works that cross boundaries of formal contractual organization. This cross disciplinary approach is critical to finding solutions that succeed not only from a formal design point of view, but also, and perhaps more importantly, through a socially responsible and sustainable lens. Together, these four practices are leading new dialogues that will set the tone for more equitable and responsible design collaboration. The panel represents a wide-ranging collection of voices, with distinct individual formal training and geographic representation, united by the goal of rethinking how design collaboration can flourish, no matter the contractual relationship between parties. The team will present varying opinions of how to achieve this goal in civic-scaled work, especially through community engagement and a social equity approach to design.

He is the recipient of the 2020 AIA Young Architects Award. Jeffry earned a Master of Architecture with Distinction from Harvard University, and a Bachelor and Master of Architecture from the University of Idaho. He teaches at the Harvard GSD and is a frequent design juror and speaker.

John Kett, ALSA, Managing Principal Reed Hilderbrand

As Managing Principal of Reed Hilderbrand, John focuses equally on the design of the firm itself as on individual commissions. His passion for the economic, social, and personal dimensions of practice has inspired his leadership of the firm's studio culture and ethos. John earned a BA in English and Master in Landscape Architecture from the University of Virigina, and joined Douglas Reed Landscape Architecture in 1998. UVA School of Architecture appointed John their 2020 Porter Visiting Professor in Landscape Architecture, welcoming him to lecture and teach an options studio on the past, present, and future of Boston's Franklin Park. He also serves as chair of the UVA School of Architecture Dean's Advisory Board through 2022.

Trey Trahan, FAIA, Founder Trahan Architects

Victor F. "Trey" Trahan, III, FAIA, is the Founder and CEO of Trahan Architects, established in 1992. Trey is continually exploring ways to cultivate generosity and inclusiveness in our relationships with each other and with our environments. He has pushed the practice of architecture to include far more than the built environment and approaches design first as a humanitarian, and then as an architect. As such, in 2021 he co-founded an independent nonprofit research and design agency investigating spatial infractions of democracy within the built environment. Trey was selected as the 2021 Laureate for The American Prize for Architecture.
