As an urban national park, the central focus of the Presidio is to transform a historic former army base into parkland that is inclusive and accessible to all, particularly communities that have traditionally been underrepresented in national park visitation. This session will explore how the renewal of the derelict freeway approach to the Golden Gate Bridge propelled a vision for parklands on the top of new roadway tunnels. Community action, philanthropy, and design were marshaled to transform the Presidio of San Francisco into a national park site for all.

Since 2001, Michael Boland has played a key role in making the Presidio a world class national park site. 
Richard Kennedy, Senior Principal, James Corner Field Operations
